### **SIGHT WORDS**

Sight words are commonly used words that young children are encouraged to memorise as a whole by sight, so that they can automatically recognise these words in print without having to use any strategies to decode.

You can see the Junior KG children learning certain sight words with the use of play dough.



#### REACTION TIME

As part of her end-of-year science experimental project, Varvara, our 11th grader, decided to analyse how long it took us to react.

What are the different factors that determine the reaction time of individuals? To find an answer to her problem, Varvara sent an e-mail to the LFIM community asking volunteers to record themselves reacting to different signals she had selected.

To measure visual reaction time, she asked volunteers to jump when a partner turned on a flashlight.


To measure auditory reaction time, volunteers had to turn their back on their partner and jump once their partner shouted "Go!".

After analyzing all the data received, Varvara was able to conclude that visual reaction time was not really age-dependent. Indeed, while it appeared that younger children had a higher average reaction time, older children and adolescents had the same relatively low reaction time. She also found that auditory reaction time was age-dependent and tended to increase with age.

Reaction time also depends on gender. In women, the auditory reaction time is faster. In men, the visual reaction time is shorter.

Finally, overall, auditory reaction time is faster than visual reaction time.

We congratulate Varvara who carried out this experiment all the way, thanks to the participation of many volunteers of all ages.
