EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

After a break of almost two years due to the pandemic, we resumed extra-curricular activities to the delight of our pupils. Our Kindergarten students tapped their toes under the direction of their Bollywood and Happy Feet dance teachers, reached for the stars in their Ballet class, and juggled and kicked the ball during their Football sessions. Elementary and Secondary students showed their intellectual prowess in Stem Fundamentals, Electrics & Circuits, and Chess. They stretched to their limits in Yoga, and honed their musical skills in Guitar and Electric Keyboards.









And let's not forget our dear non-French speaking parents and staff of LFIM, who have signed up for the French as a Foreign Language classes given twice a week by a teacher from the Alliance Française. We are sure that they will soon be talking to their children in French!



We first explained the concepts of floating and sinking, and then we made hypotheses to try to imagine whether the objects we had would float or sink. We then carried out experiments to see if the objects floated or sank and then worked on written text to put in the activity folder.

The students made 2 artworks. The first one was about rain.

Step 1: White chalk for the rain and puddles on 1 sheet of white paper + rainbow drawn with chalk.

Step 2: Soak the white paper with water using a sponge.

Step 3: Apply the ink with a brush to make the background (blue/turquoise/black).





The second symbolizes water.

Technique used: Shaving foam + ink + chalk.

Step 1: Put a layer of shaving foam in a tray and spread with a spatula as if making a cake.

Step 2: Add blue and green ink for the colour of the water and then mix with a chopstick or piece of wood to make the design.

Step 3: Dip a sheet of A4 paper into the mixture and press down, then remove the excess foam with a ruler.
